# STEM Under the Lens

Valley Early Learning Center staff recently have been recognized for their work in the class-room using "Ready for School with STEM" program materials, made available through a grant awarded to the Spokane County Library District from Thrive Washington. The grant program developed and provided STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering

and Math) curriculum kits to 23 early learning programs throughout Eastern Washington, including VELC.

In preparation for the school year, Lead Teachers Shellie Anderson and Christie Carter participated in a STEM training in Kennewick this past summer. During the workshop, the instructor was so impressed with their knowledge of how to implement the materials in class that he asked if it would be

possible to come to the VELC campus to learn more about how to incorporate STEM into the Creative Curriculum.

A film crew from the University of Washington arrived in late September to record interviews with Director Candace Harris, Shellie and Christie.

It was an opportunity for Shellie and Christie to shine as they described how they use the kits to teach early learners.

Harris, along with co-collaborator Katie Crise, Child Development Manager at Rural Resources, was involved in the development of the "Construction" curriculum for one of the kits. "I feel so fortunate to work with a great group of people," commented Candace. "It was evident throughout the video-taping how dedicated these two individuals are to bringing intentional and engaging activities to their classrooms so that children can learn through play."

The STEM kits are designed to make science and math topics more accessible, deliver STEM training for early learning professionals and offer STEM Play

and Learn sessions to families. The idea was to have ready-to-go activities in a bag that can be checked out for free from the libraries in Eastern Washington. The short, 10-30 minute activities included in the kits are geared toward children ages 3 to 5, and promise to make learning Science, Technology, Engineering and Math fun.

Development of the 15 kits took almost a year with the help of these great or-

ganizations: Spokane County Library District, NEW ESD 101, Spokane Public Library, Mobius Science Center, Spokane STEM, Rural Resources, Spokane Public Schools, Valley School District, Herzog Family Center, and Community-Minded Enterprises.

The kits are available for checkout at the Spokane County Library District, Spokane Public Library, Libraries of Stevens County and Valley School District. The lesson plans for the kits are available on the Spokane County Library District's web page at <a href="http://www.scld.org/getting-ready-for-kindergarten/ready-for-school-with-stem/">http://www.scld.org/getting-ready-for-kindergarten/ready-for-school-with-stem/</a>. # Foreign Exchange Students Enrich **Our School Community**

his year Paideia High School has had the ■ privilege of welcoming two foreign exchange students to the school community: Laker Lin from

Taiwan and Lucia Alvarez-Quintas from Spain. Each student is residing with a local host family for 10 months, during which time he/she will learn the American way of life, enhanced by bonds formed with teachers and peers and learning experiences in and out of class. From school spirit to free refills at the restaurant, the student is immersed in our western culture. Most students have had between six

to eleven years of English language instruction to qualify to become exchange students, easing the transition and time away from their homeland.

Columbia Virtual Academy Teacher Pat Schneider and his wife, Mara, have hosted twelve European exchange students over the years. Through his extensive, first-hand experiences, Pat attests that the benefits of hosting foreign exchange students

are reciprocal, as the youth "really do become part of your family, bringing their own unique gifts and talents." His family has learned a great deal of German from previous students.

> As Regional Coordinators of the **Education First High School Exchange** Year program, he and Mara help bring foreign exchange students to the U.S. to attend high school by working with 15 local International Exchange Coordinators in Eastern Washington and North Idaho. Together they finds hosts and match families with students that fit the families' activities,

habits and lifestyle. As EF representatives, they communicate often with students throughout the year, offering support and counseling as needed.

The Paideia students' experiences in the district seem to be positive and fulfilling so far. Below is a glimpse into what motivated each to come to the United States and our district.



#### Laker

Though Laker Lin is a long way from home, he has been enjoying his educational experience as a sophomore at Paideia and the small school atmosphere because, "You can get to know everyone and everyone is kind," he says. His main objectives in the program are to learn fluent English while continuing his education and to be immersed in local American culture, which is quite different than in his native Taiwan. "Education in Taiwan is very demanding," he states, adding, "class time is from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and then there is night class until 8 p.m. every day with several hours of homework every night!"



One aspect of America he values is the time available to socialize with friends. Laker feels that learning to build relationships is a very important tool to be successful in business. "In Taiwan, education is very intellectual," he says. "I want to use my experiences in the United States to learn a different way of thinking that I can apply to building my future."

Once he completes his education, those plans include owning his own company or business. His field of interest is electronics or robotics. "Learning English is important in business because it expands opportunities globally."

When asked what advice he would have for American students, he does not hesitate to answer: "Don't complain about everything!" adding, "Be thankful you are born in your family and respect your family because grownups have a different way of thinking and family elders have more wisdom that is good guidance." Laker is not shy about acknowledging that American students have a lack of respect. "In Taiwan, (continued on next page)

#### Lucia

ucia Alvarez-Quintas is from ■Barcelona, Spain, and she has wanted to come to the United States since a child. She had the opportunity to visit New York City and fell in love with the people and the language. She has returned as a foreign exchange student and is now enrolled as a sophomore at Paideia High School. Lucia (pronounced Luthia) knows the importance of learning English and she is here to improve her English language skills. She stated, "I want my English to be perfect!"

Coming from a school of over 800 students, Lucia enjoys the small class sizes at PHS, saying, "I can develop a working relationship with the teachers," and adding, "Teachers here have the time to help me to make improvements."



When comparing her education to what she was receiving in Spain, she stated, "High school in the U.S. is easier because you get to go slower. In Spain education is mostly lectures, lots of exams and over two hours of homework every night."

Once she completes her sophomore year at PHS, Lucia plans to return to Spain to finish two more years of high school and stay on track for attending a university. Lucia wants to study science, her favorite subject, and apply her education in the field of nutrition. "I love science and to cook, as well as to help people feel better, so nutrition is the perfect choice!" she asserts.

When asked what advice she had to offer to American students, she replied "Be brave!" adding that she notices a lack of confidence in students here. "Though things look very difficult and the future may seem daunting, don't be afraid to be older," she heartens.

#### **Musical Encounters**

s part of the Valley School music program, all Kindergarten through 5th grade students study the orchestra: its instrument families, sections in the orchestra, as well as a variety of major influential composers. Each October, 4th grade students from the region have the opportunity to hear the unique sounds of the orchestral instruments in person at an interactive concert presented by the Spokane Symphony.

This year's Musical Encounter program was designed by the Symphony's Assistant Conductor, Jorge Luis Uzcátegui, on the theme "History through Music." In the beautifully restored Martin Woldson Theater at The Fox, Valley's 4th grade classes and teachers were serenaded with musical pieces from the Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Modern and current periods.

Prior to the field trip, we watched instructional videos on the Spokane Symphony website to introduce students to Conductor Uzcátegui and some of the orchestral works featured in the Symphony's program. We also practiced singing a section of Beethoven's 9th Symphony Chorus, "Ode to Joy," which we sang with other attendees at the concert.

#### **Nature Excursion**

Talley School's 4th graders experienced an amazing day of extended learning in the great outdoors at the annual Lake Roosevelt Water Festival in Kettle Falls on September 13th. Students attended a variety of classes led by different agencies from our community,

> including the National Park Service, Avista, the Spokane Tribe, the Conservation District, and Department of Fish and Wildlife.

> One of the student's favorite stations was "Kids in the Creek." Students got to put on tall orange rubber boots and search Sherman Creek for water bugs, then determine if those bugs are tolerant or intolerant of pollu-

tion. They found many intolerant bugs, which indicates that Sherman Creek is not polluted.

They also learned about hydro power, and how power travels from Grand Coulee Dam to our homes. During the "Squirrel Story" class, they played a game to learn about predators and prey and what it takes for a squirrel to survive. They especially enjoyed getting to touch and look close up at many pelts from animals around our area, and learn facts about those animals. One group got to learn about the sturgeon that inhabit Lake Roosevelt and that these fish are considered prehistoric.

# Horticulture Center Construction Is Progressing

onstruction on the new Horticulture Center on the Paideia High School campus has been

underway since mid-September. The site was leveled and foundation poured and prepped for insulation



in anticipation of delivery of the Curvco Quonset Hut building, which arrived at month's end.

The uniquely-shaped metal building was fully erected by the end of October by the Facilities Team, who have been working tirelessly on door framing and finishing tasks. Superintendent Foster reports that the team's dedication and enthusiasm for the project has kept the project on schedule and saved the district at least \$20,000.

In anticipation, the PHS Biology students are studying horticulture-related learning goals,

> using dirt in preparation for the hydroponics systems that will be used in the Horticultural Center. Princi-

pal Matt Cox is testing a working hydroponics unit at his home that can grow up to 15 lettuce plants. The plan is to have students build five more units as a starting point to the program.
